BECOME A BENEFACTOR

The Permanent Fund helps ensure the Rotary Foundation's ability to meet future needs through an endowment. The endowment gifts are invested with only a portion of the interest earned used for purposes specified by the donor. The remaining interest is returned to the principal. The goal is to ensure the principal maintains its real value over time.

Your can contribute to the Permanent Fund by completing a small form that notifies RI you have included the Permanent Fund in your estate plan.

The "Benefactor" level is notification of a gift of between \$1000 and \$10,000. The "Bequest Society" are gifts over \$10,000. The Rotary Foundation welcomes outright gifts of cash, securities, real estate or tangible personal property. Many people create a lasting legacy by establishing an Endowed Fund within the Permanent Fund. Life income agreements can provide for you during your life and then can pass to the Permanent Fund at a later day.

FROM THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Rotary was not born with a giant game plan in mind. It just evolved. It has become a story of little moments-magical moments. The 100th anniversary is a good time to reflect on what I call the Milestones of Rotary. These are the times that have made Rotary what it is today.

Many articles have been written since February 23, 1905 about the beginning of Rotary. The men who met for friendship and to exchange business ideas while having fun are well known.

THE FIRST MILESTONE was in 1906 when a proposed member wanted to know the purpose of this club. Don Carter joined but quickly insisted on Community Service as an object.

THE SECOND MILESTONE implemented Community Service by building restrooms in downtown Chicago. A minister was aided when the Rotary Club purchased a horse to replace his deceased one.

THE THIRD MILESTONE came when a Rotarian lost his son in an accident. He was told a hospital in the area would have saved the boy. So "Daddy" Allen, a concerned Rotarian, began enlisting other Rotarians to erect crippled children's wings in hospitals. This was the beginning of the Easter Seals Society.

THE FOURTH MILESTONE came when Arch Klumph authored the constitution for Rotary, divided Rotary into districts headed by a District Governor, and began the annual District Conference. He suggested a fund should be started to allow Rotary to accomplish future tasks. The Rotary Endowment Fund was born, but soon became known as the Rotary Foundation.

THE FIFTH MILESTONE came after the death of Paul Harris in 1947. Memorial contributions were made to the Rotary Foundation. That year \$1 million was raised with 118 scholarships awarded. The money continues to provide funding for many Rotary programs.

THE SIXTH MILESTONE recognizes Rotary as a global organization. Rotarians have aided in peacemaking, been influential with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the eradication of polio. In 1945, Rotary was involved in the finalizing of the charter of the United Nations.

THE SEVENTH MILESTONE was when Rotary began to start worldwide programs to help with poverty, hunger, polluted drinking water, illiteracy, and disease.

THE EIGHTH MILESTONE brought the first 3-H polio immunization event that led to PolioPlus. Rotary's finest hour will be the elimination of polio in 2005.

MORE CONFERENCE

RI President Glenn Estess has announced Stephen Garrett, PDG of District 5300 in Southern California, will serve as his representative to the District Conference. PDG Garrett, an accomplished Rotarian and professional presenter, will be speaking at several of the Conference sessions. Other outstanding speakers at the Conference will include Richard King, 2002-2002 RT President, Past District Governor Allan Frumkin, and Dr. Joe Serra who is a Past District Governor and international liaison for the PolioPlus program.

THE NINTH MILESTONE was 1986 when membership exceeded one million. Most join Rotary because of the desire to help others as well as the fellowship involved.

THE TENTH MILESTONE brought the admission of women to a previously all male organization. This brought a new source of membership with women also adding vitality, creativity, vigor, and dedication.

THE ELEVENTH MILESTONE was in 1992 when the Permanent Fund was added to the Rotary Foundation. This fund will continue to grow because only the earnings can be spent.

THE TWELFTH MILESTONE was in 2001 when Rotary launched the development of a strategic plan to guide us into the next century. We will eradicate polio, sharpen program focus, select new corporation program, refine governance-leadership structure, improve training, expand membership, and enhance our public image.

We begin a new century remembering what we have accomplished. We are not heroes, but we are ordinary people doing extraordinary things. Each of us must do the best we can to make our club the best it can be. This will enable Rotary to continue to be a world leader.

Let us be proud we are part of this great adventure.

GOVERNOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Rotary International requires the District select its Governor-Nominee by a Nominating Committee. District 5190's Nominating Committee is composed of the five immediate past District Governors, the current District Governor, the District Governor Elect and any other Rotarians the District Governor appoints. District Governor-Nominees are selected in accordance with the rules set forth in section 13.020 of the RI Bylaws.

Clubs are invited to submit their suggestions for nominations for Governor. The Nominating Committee shall consider these suggestions that must reach the Committee by April 29, 2005. This is the announced date established by the District Governor. The suggestions shall be submitted in the form of a resolution naming the suggested candidate. The resolution must be adopted by the club at a regular meeting and certified by the Club Secretary. A club may suggest a candidate for Governor-Nominee who is a member of another club if the suggesting club first obtains the concurrence of the club where such candidate is a member.

The Nominating Committee for Governor shall not be limited in its selection to those names submitted by clubs in the District. The Committee shall seek out and nominate the Rotarian who is best qualified and available to serve as Governor-Nominee.

The Nominating Committee shall notify the Governor of the candidate selected. The Governor shall then publish to the clubs in the District the name and club of the nominee.

When the Nominating Committee cannot agree upon a candidate, the Governor-Nominee shall be elected in a ballot-by-mail. Alternatively, the Governor-Nominee may be selected from among those candidates suggested to the Nominating Committee at the District Conference following the regulations set forth in section 15.050 of the RI Bylaws.

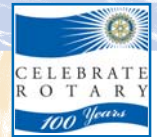

APPLICATIONS NEEDED

The Rotary Foundation has partnered with eight leading universities around the world to establish the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution. Each year Rotary will select up to 70 scholars to study at one of these seven centers. The selected scholars will begin two-year master's level degree programs in conflict resolution, peace studies, and international relations.

District 5190 is accepting applications for 2006-2008. Each club may submit one application that must be received by June 1. District interviews will be June 15. Applications can be downloaded at www.rotary.org and click on the Foundation page. The requirements and qualifications are described in detail on the website.

RI DIRECTOR ELECT

It was truly an honor to be nominated to serve as Rotary International Director and even more exciting to be elected in Osaka, Japan last June. The official vote there ended the selection process and the responsibility phase began.

I did not fully appreciate the selection process until I became involved as a potential candidate. Every two years a director is selected from the Zone 23 and 24 areas. The zones alternate so Zone 23 selects a candidate every four years. I was selected by a panel of Past District Governors from the 12 districts located in Zone 23. This zone is composed of central and northern California, Washington, Oregon, and all of Nevada except Las Vegas. After interviews the committee must select a candidate with a 60% majority. The RI President announces the official nominee with the official confirming vote taken at the following International Convention. And the work begins.

I attended the first orientation session in February in Evanston, Illinois. The work and service of Rotary really occurs at the club level, but the Board of Directors determines the

majority of broad based direction and policy. The Board is also responsible for overseeing the administration of the Rotary budget, the General Secretary and other matters that often have an affect on clubs and districts.

The Board is composed of the President, President Elect and 17 other board members from around the world. It is a truly unique process of governance and one in which I look forward to participating.

I will basically represent Zone 23 and 24, my zones of origin. These two zones include California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, and Hawaii. However, I carry the responsibility of representing Rotarians everywhere. An issue that might be simple and uncomplicated in our district or zone may have significant impact in another country or locale. The cultural implications of decisions must be carefully weighed and the ultimate impact on all of Rotary should be the foremost concern.

I extend my heartfelt thanks to those of you who encouraged my candidacy. My term begins June 1, 2005 through June 30, 2007. I will do my best to represent my club, my district, the zone and you as a fellow District 5190 Rotarian in a manner that will serve the best interests of Rotary worldwide.
