The RI Council on Legislation is scheduled to debate more than 200 proposed enactments and resolutions during the 2010 session. Whereas the Board of Directors sets policies for Rotary International, the triennial Council on Legislation is where Rotary clubs submit proposals that affect the governance of our organization. Every club and District is entitled to submit legislation to the Council. Some of Rotary's most important work has resulted from Council action, including our PolioPlus program. The Council is made up of more than 500 representatives, including one elected representative from each district. Non-voting members include the chair and vice chair of the council, the RI president, members of the RI Board, and past RI presidents. Area 11 was the "Sagebrush II" trip for District Governor Janice except she went deeper into the heart of it this time, almost to the edge of Utah. District 5190 is purported to be the largest in the lower 48 and Area 11 is larger than any district in California. Area 11 is larger than Pennsylvania, Alabama or Mississippi. Our 2 most distant Clubs, Winnemucca and Ely are 312 miles apart. A lot to cover.

DG Janice made a whirlwind trip of it in making her DG Visits earlier this year. She arrived in Elko on a Tuesday night after a 400 mile drive, met with the Board on Wednesday morning, had lunch with the club and retired to get caught up on her paperwork. Then the marathon! Breakfast with the Elko Desert Sunrise Club at 6:30, a meeting with the Board, the 190 mile drive to Ely, a meeting with the Board, lunch and then ---- the 450 miles home in a straight shot. Over a 1000 miles total and 650 miles and 2 meetings in one day. Tough day, tough trip, tough lady.

Last month Area 11 had its Foundation Dinner and it was imminently successful, thanks to the participation of both the Ely and Winnemucca Clubs for the first time. A number of their members made the effort to come to Elko for the evening to bring the total attendance to 90. The silent and live auctions combined to raise \$4000 for the Foundation. District Governor Elect Steve Lewis and his wife Ginny were in attendance representing DG Janice, who had made a previous commitment to the Foundation Dinner in Alturas. Our speaker for the evening was Ambassadorial Scholar Jean Irwin, a member of the Reno Centennial Sunset Club. Jean spoke about how her Foundation Scholarship had made such a difference in her career as a teacher of the deaf and what a lasting influence it has been in her life. DGE Steve conferred a number of Paul Harris Fellowships and presented a special District Foundation Award to a deserving member of each club. In all, a wonderful evening of Rotary conviviality.

The Ely Club, under the leadership of Steve Gray, has striven to excel in Eastern Nevada. They have budgeted over \$20,000 to benefit White Pine County Schools. They are awarding scholarships to the graduating seniors to help them continue their education. Their annual fundraisers, the Ely Rotary Club's Annual Ice fishing Derby and the Rotary Golf Tournament (planned for June 5, 2010), con-

tinue to support the club and the community. They were able to provide dictionaries to all the third graders in White Pine County. They have assisted in providing reading glasses, uniforms and food to several of their schools in the community. They were able to donate \$2000 to the medical clinic in Haiti after the devastating earthquake. The Ely Rotary Club has done a tremendous job in supporting their community in the spirit of Rotary. What's more, they are a 100% Paul Harris Club! And they are consummate fundraisers. Maybe the best in the district for a club of about 35 members.

Elko was chartered in 1928 having been sponsored by the Ely Club. President Travis Gerber has had a successful year in presenting the club's large array of scholarships to graduating high school students. The Rotaract Club is doing well at Great Basin College under our sponsorship. April 24 was our Rotarians-At-Work Day. The club was heavily involved in building the Johnny Appleseed Playground in the city park a number of years ago and they organized to repair, refinish and stain the project. They also provided dictionaries to the third graders in Elko County schools. Elko is one of the larger clubs in the district with a membership of 96.

Elko Desert Sunrise was chartered in 1989 sponsored by the Elko Club. Under the able presidency of Anita Franzoia, the club has achieved all its goals for the year. Anita's committee did a fantastic job in bringing the Foundation Dinner to a new standard through many hours of planning and doing. Their club had two successful fundraisers in their Bowl-a-Thon and the Purple Pinkie for Polio. They have provided food and Christmas trees for the needy at Christmastime. They also provide several scholarships to graduating high school students. They did their 1 net new member so they are now at 31.

The Winnemucca Rotary Club is a young and vital club having been chartered by Elko, Elko Desert Sunrise and Fallon in 2007 and are now at 23 members. Michelle Urain, their very energetic president, is doing a marvelous job. She will be the incoming Assistant Governor for Area 11 and is well suited for the endeavor. Winnemucca Rotarians have been busy growing their club! The club sponsors an elementary school vision screening that has officially gone to every elementary school in Humboldt County. This year alone they have screened over 100 kids for vision problems that may result in learning problems in the classroom. The club also built synergies with other local service organizations like the Lions Club. In Winnemucca, community service is their top priority. Their members serve at the soup kitchen once a month and are actively involved in many community activities.

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Message from Polio Survivor

As a polio survivor of the 1946 epidemic in Texas, I am particularly close to the Help Stop Polio Project. Last year, Rotary of Elko, Desert Sunrise and a variety of fundraisers, raised about \$8,000. Jim Nisbet ran a stunning Bowlathon, several members assembled Polio Plus canisters for local businesses to collect donations and I put together a power point to present to clubs and schools in our area.

One of the amazing effects of the programs was the heightened awareness, not only about Polio, but about Rotary International. When I asked for a show of hands of those who had heard of Polio, there were only one or two, but when I asked how many had heard of Rotary International, there were even fewer hands that went up. At the end of each power point, which included photos of me as a child with crutches, a brace and a withered leg, I would show the students a pair of my shoes. Due to the polio, the numerous surgeries and casts, my shoe sizes are a 5 1/2 and a 9 1/2, but I would show them a favorite pair of red velvet shoes and emphasize that polio did not deter me from dancing or having a closet full of colorful shoes. This new awareness about polio inspired the local Boys and Girls Club and Spring Creek High School to raise money from their dances to donate to Rotary International for the End Polio Now Program.

In November 2009, I joined 34 Rotarians from the US to travel to Benin, Africa to inoculate children for polio. Our team gave polio drops and marked purple pinkies to 3,313 children in one day in rural Benin. I was the only Ne-



vadan in the group. One of my most powerful experiences happened when our team of four encountered the first vil-lager that refused to allow his daughter to be inoculated. I appealed to the mother (through our French interpreter) by pulling up my pant leg and showing my crippled leg, asking, "do you want your daughter to end up with a leg like this?" She pleaded with the father, he relented and we inoculated the girl. We repeated this performance in each of the nine villages we entered with 100% success!

The Rotary of Elko, Noon Club paid the printing costs for 18 booklets that were created with information and color photos of our Native Americans, Hispanics, Basques, and Cowboys and also photos of the local Rotarian projects. I gave these to a few Rotarians in West Africa but most of them went to schools in Ghana where I spent three weeks following the Benin experience. Rotary of Elko, Desert Sunrise had purchased soccer balls and 88 bandanas for me to distribute in the rural schools in Ghana where I taught the children to draw cowboys. My daughters had sent along school supplies for me to distribute also. The children

learned from the booklets about our region of Nevada and were taught how to draw a cowboy. They then each received a ban-



dana. This is an outreach project I have done in many countries around the world because I believe the world is our neighborhood where we discover that our similarities build bridges and our differences create interests. Drawing cowboys creates instant interest. I would be happy to travel to Rotary Clubs anywhere to present my new power-point about the African project: 'Stopping Polio in West Africa' and teaching children to draw cowboys!

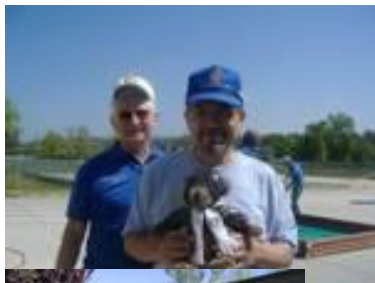
What Paul said.. . . .

In other Rotaract news, The Rotaract Club of Reno organized a 5K Fun Run and 2 Mile Walk to benefit Polio Eradication. Over 200 people registered for the Purple Pinkie Fun Run which was held on April 11th, 2010. The club had two major sponsors support the run, The Northern Nevada Immunization Coalition and Morrey Distributing Co, as well as donations from the local business community and Rotary clubs in Area 8. Two running clubs, Reno Running and Fitness and the Silver State Striders lent timing equipment to help make the run a success. The event raised approximately \$4,500 for the Rotary Foundation. The dates for the second annual Polio Purple Pinkie Fun Run will be announced soon.

Speaking of fun, the Rotaract Club of Reno will be holding their annual Vino for Reno silent auction and wine tasting on May 13th, 2010 from 6pm to 9pm at the Moana Nursery in Reno. 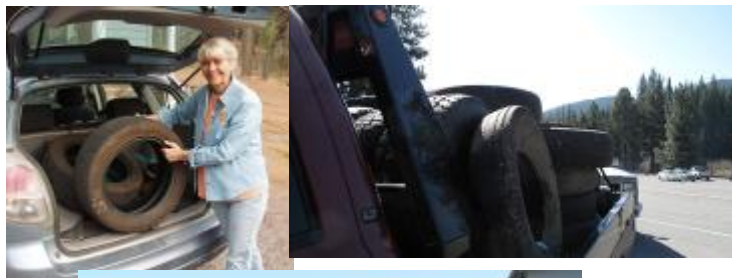

HUMANITARIAN AWARD

For several years now, the Rotary Club of Nevada County South has had the distinction of being among a select group of clubs worldwide, who are 100% Paul Harris Sustaining members. Named after the founder of Rotary, the Paul Harris Fellowship was established in 1957.

By way of a minimum donation annually of \$100 to the Rotary Foundation, a Rotarian becomes a Paul Harris Sustaining member. When the donations accumulate to \$1000, the member becomes a Paul Harris Fellow.

These donations are used for a variety of humanitarian and educational programs throughout the world. The purpose of such programs is to save and invigorate the lives of people around the world and ENHANCE international friendship and understanding.

The Rotary Foundation has provided educational opportunities, food, potable water, health care, immunizations, and shelter to MILLIONS of people around the globe.

Rotarians and Rotary Clubs can DESIGNATE a Paul Harris Fellow to any person whose life demonstrates a shared purpose with the objectives and mission of the Rotary Foundation to build world understanding and peace.

Last month, I asked the NCS Board of Directors to approve the establishment of a new award that could be given to an individual or organization who actively engages in improving the quality of life in our community. The Humanitarian award would recognize those individuals who have concern for or help to improve the welfare and happiness of others in our community.

This Humanitarian Award, coupled with a Paul Harris Fellowship is the HIGHEST honor our club can bestow upon a member of our community.

It is with great honor that I bestow this first time Humanitarian Award AND a Paul Harris Fellowship too Sandy Schmidt and Jennifer Singer.

Sandy Schmidt is the Founder and Executive Director of Women of Worth (www.women-of-worth.org). The group helps women in crisis, especially those escaping domestic violence and sexual assault. Jennifer Singer helped co-found “The Friendship Club” in 1995 and is currently the Executive Director. The Club (found at www.friendshipclub.org) is a prevention program designed to reach at-risk girls before they engage in unhealthy behaviors.
